# This year, East Preston's Christmas starts on 26<sup>th</sup> November


This year's East Preston Christmas Celebrations will again be a great way of starting your Christmas season.

Father Christmas's Storytime was so successful last year, more places will be available so more children can take part. Storytime slots will be at 13:00, 14:00 and 15:00. All children will receive a gift bag at the end of the story. It will be necessary to pre-book for Storytime with Father Christmas. # Improving animal welfare abroad

For the latest in our occasional series of articles featuring an East Preston resident's involvement with a charity, we met Lindsay Geddes.

In 2005, before moving to East Preston, pharmacist Lindsay holidayed on the Greek island of Paxos. At that time, the island had never been home to a veterinary surgery and there seemed to be little animal welfare.

Back at home, Lindsay decided to act. Told by friends she would never get an answer, Lindsay wrote to the then Mayor of Paxos offering to help him with animal welfare on the island.

Much to her surprise, she received an enthusiastic and supportive response. With the money she could have spent had she brought a Greek cat home with her, Lindsay started Paxos Animal Welfare Society (PAWS). As well as some education, PAWS supplies veterinary services to the island, ensuring the stray cat population remains under control.

"Left unneutered, two cats can end up as a million cats after five years. We knew we were winning when the first Greek man brought in a cat to be neutered. Previously, and understandably, Greek men had been particularly reluctant at denying male cats their manhood."

Very occasionally, the charity needs to rehome an animal into the UK. Back in April, Lindsay asked the council if it could advertise

that Mike, a 5-year-old crossbreed, needed a new home. Within a few days, Vanessa and Steve had agreed to adopt Mike, and he arrived in East Preston at the end of June.

Lindsay summed up by saying, "A huge thank you to Steve and Vanessa for giving Mike the home he deserves."

Sadly, in the middle of September, Vanessa passed away after a period of illness. Vanessa was well-known and much-loved around the village. Steve said, "Mike and Vanessa fell in love at first sight. Vanessa was delighted to be able to give Mike a new and loving home. We will both miss her greatly."

# A new clock for the village

In September, a new clock was installed on land at the northern shops. In the 1960s, there used to be a clock attached to the wall above what is now the chemist. A couple of years ago, we asked you how you would like the village to mark Queen Elizabeth II's Platinum Jubilee, and one of the suggestions we received was for a new clock in the centre of the village.

Response to the clock has been fantastically positive, far above what we could have wished for. Comments received have included: "I think it's lovely. Well done ep council", "Lovely clock. Really enhances this end of the village" and "What a lovely addition to our village xx". Thank you.

Despite the council's best efforts, it was only possible to install the clock soon after the passing of Her Majesty, leading a few residents to ask what the clock would be called. The council has given this due thought and has settled on **The Queen Elizabeth II's Platinum Jubilee Clock**. That is the official name, but we will be happy for it to be known unofficially as just the East Preston or Jubilee Clock.

## **Village Bus Service**

After a delay because of the pandemic, the parish council is pleased to announce a trial of the bus service to the south end of the village will start on 11<sup>th</sup> April 2023. This trial will be for one year and, should it prove successful, it is hoped the service will continue.

The timetable will be Monday to Friday daytimes and will start from Tesco in Littlehampton and take a route past the Leisure Centre, through Rustington, into the village along Vicarage Lane and down to and around the Village Green and back to terminate at Sainsbury's. Exact timings and stopping points are being finalized.

Bus passes will be permitted and it is hoped residents will use this service as much as possible in order for it to continue.





## East Preston Festival news

# East Preston in Bloom

### **Autumn Update**

The group has had a busy few months, weeding overgrown areas in the village, planting up new areas and planning new projects.

We have added plants, kindly donated by a resident, to the existing beds at the northern shops and will nurture and maintain these through the winter months.

The library frontage was enhanced with the planting up in July of begonias in planters, all donated by Ferring Nurseries. The plants are still thriving in October, but we have plans to add more colour for the winter months.

We have started work on a newly cultivated bed at the western end of Two Acres. A Rowan tree will be planted in the middle of the bed with the addition of evergreen shrubs providing colour and texture throughout the year. Christine, Patrick, and Sandra are seen forking in the rotted manure to the bed.

The Village Green woodland glade has been planted up with a variety of shrubs. Carol, Terry, Pam, and John have worked on the planning of the planting and hope that this will add a new area of interest and colour to the Village Green.



We don't intend to be idle through the winter, with a programme to plant up many areas with spring bulbs.

Our friendly group meets regularly and whilst we are very pleased to enhance the appearance of the village, we also like meeting new people, stopping for a coffee and a chat. If you wish to join our group, please contact Pat Gander on cllr.patricia.gander@eastpreston-pc.gov.uk.

### **GREEN ROOFING**

A member of our Environmental group suggested that we consider green roofing in the village at our last meeting. There are a number of community benefits to growing flora on roofs including helping to manage stormwater, saving energy, as well as the enjoyment of seeing more green spaces in our community. Clearly the weight and the potential damage caused by plants also need to be carefully considered.

Green roofing has a long history - one of the Seven Wonders of the Ancient World being the Hanging Gardens of Babylon. Today however you are more likely to see green roofing on the top of bus shelters and this seemed like a good place to start when considering the project as the Parish Council owns the four wooden bus shelters within the village. As these all have pitched rather than flat roofs this is another issue we need to consider when choosing the type of covering.

Green Roofs comes in two main types - extensive, lightweight and low maintenance typically using sedum vegetation, or intensive which aim to replicate what can be found at ground level and are consequently heavier and require more maintenance.

The feeling of our meeting was to consider an extensive type as this would offer a better fit for our existing shelters.

Over the next few weeks we will be conducting more research and contacting potential suppliers to see if this is a viable project. If you have any thoughts, experience or expertise in this area or feel you may be able to help please contact the Parish Council office. As always we would welcome your support.
