

Should the parish council adopt the Conservative Hall?



A few years ahead of its centenary, the current Trustees of the Conservative Hall have approached the parish council offering to give the Conservative Hall to the village through the council.

This could be the best opportunity to bring the hall into public ownership, so it continues to be a community venue, there for all the events which currently take place and more. The council would be able to build upon the improvements recently made by the Trustees. The council has some reserves which could be spent on such improvements without the need to increase your council tax initially.

The hall was officially opened in December 1928. Amongst its many former uses, the hall hosted school lunches for the village's school before it

moved to its current site in Lashmar Road. In the second half of the 1950s, village pantomimes were performed in the hall. The hall has hosted an almost infinite variety of village activities, continuing to do so alongside the Village Hall which opened in 1982.

Although no agreement has yet been reached, the council would want the Conservative Hall to run alongside the Village Hall, not in competition with the Village Hall. We hope you will agree the village needs and can support both venues. There are already some groups which use both venues; for example, the East Preston & Kingston Horticultural Society uses the Village Hall for its big Summer Show and the Conservative Hall for its talks and smaller shows.

Village Green car park

The Conditions of Use for the Village Green car park have recently changed. With immediate effect, all users need to pay. Since the introduction of the Automatic Number Plate Recognition (ANPR) System last June, Blue Badge holders are no longer able to park for free as the system is unable to recognize Blue Badge vehicles.

The ANPR cameras will record a user's entry and exit times and the first 15 minutes of a user's time will be free. Thereafter, a fee of 50 pence per hour is to be paid regardless of the time of day. Methods of payment are cash or the Poppay app which you can download to your smartphone.

2024/25 precept

A portion of the Council Tax every household pays annually to Arun District Council funds most of the work the parish council undertakes on behalf of and in the village. That portion is called the precept.

The precept sum generally goes up each year, roughly in line with inflation. Sometimes the increase is a bit more than inflation if the council has a project it wishes to undertake on your behalf.

For the fourth year running, the council has agreed to freeze the precept, effectively giving you a small amount of extra money to spend in the village.

Boom

Chairman of the Council, Cllr Steve Toney, said, "This council is very happy to be joining other local councils in working with Boom Community Bank. We know the bank is already working with some East Preston residents and hope our liaison will enable it to work with more East Preston households in tackling debt and saving responsibly." Graham Mayes, Operations Lead at Boom Community Bank, said, "We're delighted with the Council's recent decision to join Boom. Not only does this move ensure the protection and accessibility of the Council's funds,

but importantly for East Preston residents, the investment enhances Boom's capacity to provide fair financial services throughout the Parish. The timing of the Council's support is critical as Boom prepares for an increase in demand for affordable finance and debt consolidation this year.

Who's Metro?

For all the high-end cars which buzz and purr around East Preston, it's a humble Austin Metro which has made the journey from the village to the National Motor Museum at Beaulieu. Humble yes, but also very special.

Crayford Engineering was a Kent-based firm which specialised in limited-edition variants of popular cars, mainly convertibles at a time manufacturers had stopped including convertibles in their ranges. One such was a convertible Austin Metro. Owing to accusations of industrial espionage, this was so limitededition only two examples were ever made.

In 2003, East Preston residents Margaret and Alan Dowers bought themselves a Metro convertible as Alan was looking for a project car to restore. The car was first registered in March 1981, and became known as OKR within the family. Soon after it came to East Preston, Margaret and Alan's son, Guy, was watching the sole episode of Doctor Who spin-off, K-9 and Company, and spotted a Metro convertible. A quick look at the number plate confirmed this was OKR. The car was used by Sarah Jane Smith, one of the Doctor's longestserving companions, later having her own series, The Sarah Jane Adventures. Sarah Jane was played by Elisabeth Sladen who, at the time of filming, had only recently passed her driving test and needed an easyto-drive car.

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East Preston in Bloom plans for 2024

The group had a busy 2023, creating flower beds in Two Acres, the Village Green, and at the Library. Additionally, members have been very active weeding and maintaining many public areas in the village. In the Autumn we planted many Spring bulbs and look forward to seeing them flowering soon, welcoming in Spring.

We are enthusiastic about our plans for the coming year. Having liaised with the parish council we are developing a 'quiet garden' in the south-eastern corner of the Warren Recreation Ground. The area has been cleared of the overgrown weeds, and flowering shrubs and bulbs planted. A new bench, a replacement bench, a picnic table, and a tree are all part of the plan for providing an area of tranquillity, enabling residents to shelter from the sunshine, read, meditate, watch the cricket or generally take a break from the everyday bustle of life.

Responding to residents' concerns about the overgrown weeds and general unkempt nature of the verges in Roundstone Drive, we have started tidying and planting flowering plant borders – all with the agreement of Arun District Council. This is a large project for our small group, so we would like it to



be adopted as a community project going forward, welcoming help from residents in the neighbourhood.

We have plans to work with the parish and county councils to plant native flowers creating nature-friendly verges to encourage wildlife and pollinator highways. This is a county-wide scheme and is already popular in many areas of the county and countrywide.

Repair reuse and recycle -The Repair Café story

We live in a disposable society so in an effort to reduce the amount of waste we take to the tip the Parish Council is taking action and is planning to set up a Repair Café to start on the second Saturday in May. Repair Café was started by Martine Postma in Amsterdam in 2009. Frustrated with our throwaway culture she produced a guide on how to produce less waste – mainly by fixing or repairing things that would have otherwise gone into the bin. The idea spread, and there are now an estimated 1,500 Repair Cafés located in 33 countries.

Repair Cafés are all about repairing things to stop them going to landfill. Visitors bring their broken items from home - clothes, furniture, electrical appliances, bicycles, toys, et cetera. We're aiming to recruit volunteer handy men and women to repair these items and hopefully pass on their skills. If you have nothing to repair, you can enjoy a cup of tea or coffee or you can lend a hand with someone else's repair job.



To help we need volunteers who are willing to give up 3-4 hours a month. 20mph zone - an update

We spoke too soon!

We were confident good progress was being made with West Sussex County Council (WSCC) Highways to introduce a 20mph zone covering The Street, Sea Road and Fairlands. At the end of 2022, nearly 300 of you voted in an online survey, with the vast majority in favour of the proposal.

Submitted under the government-funded Traffic Regulation Order scheme, the proposal successfully passed two assessments by WSCC Highways; but when a Highways officer visited the site he became concerned with the scale of the proposal and after subsequent cost analysis said it could not be progressed through that scheme.

Our response has been to say we wish to scale

back the current proposal to cover the Sea Road stretch only, which we believe presents the greatest risk to personal injury, so it can go ahead without further delay.

We will then be able to proceed with another submission under a different government-funded scheme to include The Street and Fairlands and consult further regarding the possible inclusion of other roads which many residents said they were also concerned about.

At the time of writing, we have put this to Highways and await an answer.

Meanwhile, further public consultation has taken place on the proposal to extend the doubleyellow lines on the main road by the northern shops. Already supported by Sussex Police, the response to the public consultation was judged very favourable by Highways and the scheme will be implemented in due course.

D-Day

The 6th June will mark the 80th anniversary of D-Day, the decisive turning-point in the Second World War in Europe.

To mark this anniversary, on the 2nd June, the council is helping to host a Big D-Day Lunch on the Village Green, in conjunction with East Preston Festival Committee and the East Preston & Kingston branch of the Royal British Legion. More details will follow in due course.

Do you have any family memories of D-Day and its impact upon the village? Perhaps you remember the 6in gun located to the south of South Strand or seeing soldiers undertaking final training in Kingston Gorse? Perhaps you had a father or uncle who took part in the Normandy Landings or in the Home Guard.
