East Preston Food & Drink Festival

Once again East Preston's fabulous Food & Drink Festival will be taking place on the Village Green on the Saturday of Bank Holiday weekend, 24th August between midday and 5pm. The event offers a "feastival" of food and drink delights as well as some children's entertainment. We hope you will want to come again, and if you have not been before, please come along and find out what you have been missing.

As before, the council has selected a mix of stalls - some old favourites and some first-timers. The East Preston flag will be flown high by local favourites Ristorante Al Mare, The Clockhouse Bar, Classic Ices and Seaview Stores. Amongst the stalls returning will be: Hardy's Fudge, Perfectly Preserved, DJ's Spot (Slovakian food), Kung Fu Pan (Malaysian food), JJ's Cider, Jojo's Candy Cabin, Cheesology, Halloumillicious and Chocolate Gone Mad. New stalls will include the A Tribe Called Veg (plantbased Mexican), Chopperwhoppers (chopped and rolled ice-cream), Don Quijote (South American BBQ), MagPies Magnificent Pies and Sussex Lamb (burgers and salads, all day breakfasts). Please note these details are subject to change at short notice.



Whatever your taste in food there is bound to be something here to appeal and who knows, you might discover something new for your taste buds. Stop on the Village Green to eat what you have bought or take it down to the beach for the afternoon and pick up something else for tea on your way back home!

Please read these boring but important bits... We have tried to keep them to a minimum but for everyone's safety there will be some road closures. With the exception of event vehicles, Willowhayne Crescent will be closed between 9am and 6pm. Additionally, Sea Road from the southern side of the entrance to Crown Place down to the junction with Seaview Road and South Strand will also be closed for the same period of time.

Please could you not leave any vehicles alongside the Village Green or in the car-park after 8am on Saturday, 24th August.

There will be alcohol available to drink at the event and there will be alcohol available to take home. Sussex Police has asked us to let everyone know that if any alcohol purchased for take home purposes is opened in public it may be seized and poured away. No opened containers of alcohol should be taken beyond the area of the event, basically the area of the road closures. Your understanding and cooperation in all these matters during this time will be much appreciated.

Dog owners are strongly advised to leave their pets at home as this event has been particularly well-attended in the past. In addition to chocolate which most dog owners know is poisonous to dogs, other foodstuffs which may be dropped on the ground during the day and which are dangerous to dogs are raw and cooked onions and various cooked meats. If you do bring them with you please ensure that they are kept on a lead at all times and bring some water for them. It would be a good idea to bring some poo bags too.

Come and meet your local councillors - the feedback

On Thursday, 13th June, the council ran its fourth annual Festival event for local people to come along and meet their councillors and, over a hot drink and a cupcake, talk to the council about life in East Preston.

Once again threatened rain held off during the event. As before, with the exception of one or two very sitespecific comments we thought it best to report back here on the comments recorded on that day. Although councillors were kept busy with members of the public throughout the whole event, there was a narrower range of topics this year than previously. Thanks to East Preston & Kingston Bowls Club, Girlguiding East Preston and Angmering District, The Clockhouse and East Preston Festival Committee for their assistance with and support of this event.

Over £50 was raised from donations made towards the cupcakes offered in support of the Alzheimer's Society's Cupcake Day. Thank you to anyone who contributed.

	What can be done about people parking on grass verges?	EPPC – if the vehicles are causing an obstruction they should be reported to Sussex Police by calling 101 or online.	
		WSCC Highways may allow you to place bollards outside your property – call 01243 642105 to find out more.	
		Beyond that, the only option we have is to ask residents and their visitors to respect our grass verges and we have asked this in newsletters before.	
	Can the tree growth currently obscuring signage along the A259 be cut back?	EPPC – referred to WSCC who have officers investigating this concern.	
	Could we implement a 20mph speed limit through the village?	EPPC – we have commissioned two automated traffic surveys which will indicate the speed of all traffic in two locations chosen in conjunction with the village's Community Speed Watch team. Information provided from the surveys could help the case for a 20mph speed limit through the village, but a 20mph speed limit is unenforceable and voluntary. We understand the police will only support a 20mph zone where it can be proven traffic is already averaging only 23mph, in which case dropping down to only 20mph is not too great an ask.	
	Could some pinch points be implemented in certain locations around the village?	EPPC – we can give this some consideration. Please send in suggestions for where pinch points are needed.	
	Several hedges in Vicarage Lane are overhanging the footpath making it difficult to walk along there. What can be done?	WSCC – overgrown hedges and such like can be reported via the LoveWestSussex website love.westsussex.gov.uk and app. The local Highways steward will then visit and speak or write to the property owner.	
	Unhappy with the condition of gutters and grass cutting, especially near the entrances to the village where the grass does not seem to have been cut.	WSCC – areas of concern should be reported to us via the LoveWestSussex website love.westsussex.gov.uk and app. The local Highways steward will then visit and initiate the appropriate action.	
	Could the external lights on the Sea Road toilet block be checked (again) as they seem to be on all day, every day?	EPPC – under investigation by the council's electrician.	
	Could we have an ATM (automated teller machine) at the southern end of the village?	EPPC – we have investigated this in the past and were required to guarantee a certain amount of usage before any bank would supply one.	
	Could we have some signs in Sea Road reminding drivers of the speed limit?	EPPC – under consideration by the council's Community Engagement Committee.

Parking



A constant concern of East Preston residents is inconsiderate parking across most of the village.

Please can dropped kerbs and driveways be kept clear and notice taken of yellow lines and parking signage as pedestrian, cyclist and driver visibility is reduced where it is most needed. Parking on grass verges causes unsightly damage. All these factors impede and complicate journeys for those with reduced mobility and pushchairs and could place them in a dangerous situation. Be more mindful as one day it could be you.

There is more traffic in the village than ever before but if everyone took a minute longer to park considerately it could make a difference to all of us.

And don't forget it is only 50p an hour to park in the Village Green car-park, and if you are just popping into a couple of the shops, you can park for free for fifteen minutes.
